## **Buckinghamshire Draft Local Plan — Consultation**

Buckinghamshire Council launched its consultation as part of the preparation for the new Buckinghamshire Local Plan 2025-2045. This important stage seeks suggestions for land that could be developed for housing, employment or other uses in the future over the next 20 years - including right here in Halton Parish and surrounding villages.

Halton Parish Council has carefully reviewed the consultation materials and has sent a consolidated response on behalf of the Parish. The response can be viewed on our website under Planning ([www.halton-pc.gov.uk](http://www.halton-pc.gov.uk)).

In addition, Halton Parish Council is working closely with Wendover and Weston Turville Parish Councils as part of a wider strategic review. Together, we aim to provide a coordinated response to the proposed sites identified within and around our parishes, ensuring that local concerns and priorities are represented effectively.

## **Remembrance Day Service**

There will be a Remembrance Day service at St Michael & All Angels, Halton on Sunday, 9th November. The service will start at 10.45 am and should last about 30 minutes. Weather permitting it will be held outside in front of the Cross of Sacrifice in the churchyard. If there is heavy rain, then the service will be held in the church with the wreaths laid at the end of the service.

Afterwards, Margaret Mathews' family will continue their tradition of providing refreshments at the Village Hall - everyone welcome. The service will be supported by RAF Halton recruits and the RAF band. Please join us. We Will Remember Them.

## Delay to the Closure of RAF Halton

The Ministry of Defence has announced that the closure of RAF Halton will now be delayed until 2030. However, the Ministry remains committed to a phased closure of RAF Halton as a whole, with a final vacation date of no earlier than 2030.

The Parish Council has written formally to our ward Councillors Peter Strachan and Dean Field to ensure the validity of the Strategic Planning Document (SPD) for the Halton Site. The SPD was created and endorsed in full consultation with the local community, and it is important that it is retained within the new Buckinghamshire Local Plan. The SPD covers the 'built' area of RAF Halton, however, the MOD has put forward the entire site for house building in Buckinghamshire Council's new local plan, which can be viewed at this web address:

## Village Verges

Halton Parish Council is now taking direct responsibility for looking after our local verges and a designated footpath, with the exception of RAF maintained Verges.

Since September, we have been working with Amersham Town Council's experienced team as our contractors. Their first jobs have included verge cutting and weed management, with further improvements planned over the coming months.

Our aim is to keep the village looking cared for, safe and welcoming, while making the most of our £2k annual budget which is set and paid for by Buckinghamshire Council.

## Community Speedwatch

We know that some of the roads around Halton are used by people that drive at excessive speeds, especially early morning and evening times when commuting. Collisions and other incidents are thankfully very rare in the village but there are probably many 'near misses' that go unreported.

Halton Parish Council set up Community Speedwatch (CSW) as part of the UK-wide initiative where local volunteers, trained and supported by local police, monitor vehicle speeds in their neighbourhoods using approved devices. They record the registration numbers of vehicles exceeding a threshold and pass the details to the police for further action (typically letters to vehicle keepers). The aim is not automatic enforcement, but rather awareness-raising and behaviour change.

### **Key elements**

Volunteers identify sites of concern (30 mph or 40 mph limits) and undertake approved sessions. Details of offending vehicles (registration, make, colour, speed, time) are passed to Thames Valley Police. Registered keepers may receive a letter. If repeat offenders are identified, police enforcement may follow.

The wider goals include reducing speeding, improving local quality of life and preventing collisions.

Over 90% of drivers that receive a first letter do not go on to receive a second one. This suggests that the vast majority of identified drivers did not become repeat offenders or, at least, did not trigger a second letter.

## **Why it matters - Community benefits**

**Road safety:** Speed is a key factor in many collisions. Reducing speed reduces both frequency and severity of crashes. This ties into wider national goals for reducing the numbers of people killed and seriously injured on our roads.

**Quality of life:** Lower speeds improve local neighbourhoods; safer for children, pedestrians, cyclists, reduce noise and intimidation from fast traffic.

**Community empowerment:** CSW gives residents a way to take constructive action rather than simply complaining. It fosters partnership between community and police.

## **How can you help?**

Volunteer for CSW. Can you give just one hour per month to help the team's visibility? It would be great to have more local support. If you are not able to stand, could you assist with admin?

## **Locations**

Help the Community Speedwatch team to identify key locations. There are several locations around Halton and the team varies its schedule to 'target' most dangerous times and locations, such as past the primary school at drop off times.
